



This workshop focuses on the practical “how to” of implementing the new BC curriculum through the lens of UDL. We will explore in detail assessment of curricular big ideas and skills from K-12, and how to build rubrics that recognize a continuum of learning, and can be used to determine letter grades and percentages as well as anecdotal comments. Tools for assessment of, for, and as learning, methods of assessing students with learning differences, and specific examples will be shared. Proven methods that reduce teacher time needed for marking and report card writing, while emphasizing critical and creative thinking will be demonstrated. The issue of core competencies, and exploring student development related to them will also be discussed.

Dr. Katz received her PhD in 2008 from the University of British Columbia in inclusive education. She is the author of “Teaching to Diversity: The Three Block Model of Universal Design for Learning,” and “Resource Teachers: A Changing Role in the Three-Block Model of UDL.” Dr. Katz taught in diverse classrooms from K-12 in Winnipeg and Vancouver for 16 years, including both special education classrooms and inclusive classrooms, in addition to working as a resource teacher, guidance counsellor, and consultant. Her work as an advocate of inclusive education has become known internationally, and she has addressed multiple audiences, including university courses, academic conferences, parent advocacy groups, educational conferences, and school and division based professional development workshops. Dr. Katz is currently an Assistant Professor in the Faculty of Education at UBC.
