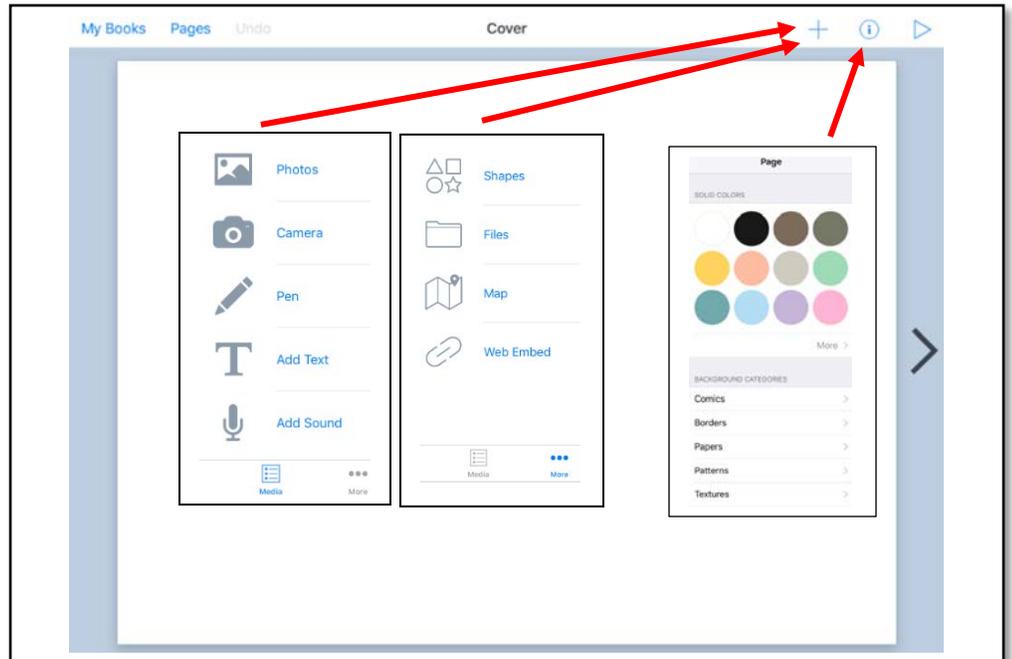
Introduction



Book Creator is a versatile web-based and app-based tool that can be used to create books, comics, or projects. It is an excellent cross-grade and cross-curricular instructional and learning tool. The books can be saved in PDF or movie format, published to iBooks, and also shared in a variety of other ways.

Task Challenge/Activity

- Either visit www.bookcreator.com to use the web-based version or download one of the apps (“Book Creator One” or “Book Creator for iPad”). Please note that “Book Creator One” allows you to create only one book for free. “Book Creator for Chrome” is also available that allows teachers to get 1 library with 40 books for free (subscriptions are also available for additional libraries and books).
- Select “New Book” to start your project (you can also create a comic if you like).
- Select the **+** button to add images, a drawing or annotation, text, sound, shapes, a link to a web page, and more.
- Select the **i** button (Inspector tool) to change colours, and to add a background.
- Select the **>** button to add additional pages.
- Select the **▶** button to view your book and have it read aloud if you like.
- Select “Pages” to view and edit the pages of your book.
- Select “My Books” to add a title and an author to your book.
- Once your book is completed, you may export it as a PDF, video, or as an ePub for iBooks.
